### Star Biscuits

# (If you don't have a star cutter, use the template on the following page.)

These biscuits can just be cut out in a star shape, drizzled with a little icing as soon as they are cold, and eaten but you could make a little hole (perhaps with a straw) before you bake them and then they could be threaded with ribbon and hung on your Christmas tree!

If you want to be really adventurous you could make 'stained glass' biscuits. Cut the dough out in a star shape, place on the baking tray and then make a bigger hole in the middle. Crush some boiled sweets into really small pieces (you may need an adult to do this for you) and using a teaspoon, fill the holes before baking. The sweets will melt and your




biscuits will look like this. (You will need to leave them to cool on the baking tray, then lift them gently off the paper and leave on a rack to get cold.)

Ingredients:36g Softened butter<br/>36g Demerara sugar (or soft brown sugar)<br/> $\frac{1}{2}$  Large egg, beaten<br/> $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon Vanilla Extract<br/>88g White flour<br/> $\frac{1}{4}$  teaspoon Cinnamon (optional)<br/>(Plus icing sugar or boiled sweets if required - see above.)

## Method:

- 1. Mix cinnamon, if using, into the flour.
- 2. Cream together butter and sugar, add egg, vanilla extract, flour and mix well.
- 3. Put onto a floured surface and gently use your hands to make the dough into a smooth ball.
- 4. Put in the fridge for about an hour.
- 5. Preheat the oven to 180°C/160°Fan/Gas Mark 4.
- 6. Line a baking tray with baking parchment.
- 7. Roll out and cut with a star cutter (making holes as above depending on how you are going to use them.) Gather up leftover dough and re-roll.
- 8. Bake for 12 minutes.
